## DOMINICA TO PARTICIPATE IN THE 2014 COMMONWEALTH GAMES IN GLASGOW

Team Dominica is set to participate in the 2014 Commonwealth Games, and the athletes will feature in the Opening Ceremony which is scheduled to take place in Celtic Park in Glasgow Scotland on 23rd July 2014.

The High Commissioner, Her Excellency Francine Baron will be representing the Government of Dominica at the Opening Ceremony. The event will be attended by Her Majesty The Queen, other members of the Royal Family, along with Heads of Government, Heads of State and Royal Families from across the Commonwealth of Nations. The Commonwealth Games Baton which has travelled to every territory of the Commonwealth arrived in Dominica on 19th March 2014 and was received with celebratory events around the island (more on page 5)







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#### MESSAGE FROM THE HIGH COMMISSIONER, HER EXCELLENCY FRANCINE BARON

I thought it fitting that my message in this Newsletter should focus on what can be considered to be a coming of age for the judicial system in Dominica.

On Tuesday the 1<sup>st</sup> of July, 2014, the Parliament of the Commonwealth of Dominica took the historic step of agreeing to amend the Constitution of Dominica to allow for Dominica to delink from the Privy Council and adopt the Caribbean Court of Justice (CCJ) as its final appellate court for appeals in civil and criminal matters. This amendment put forward by the Roosevelt Skerrit Administration, required the concurrence of two thirds of the elected members of Parliament (a total of 16). There were 18 votes in favour by Government elected MP's. Of the three elected MP's on the opposition side, one abstained and the other two were absent for the vote. The Bill will now be forwarded to His Excellency the President for his Assent.

This decision of the Parliament of Dominica will result in Dominica becoming the first OECS country and the fourth country in CARICOM (after Barbados (2005), Guyana (2005) and Belize (2010), to adopt the CCJ as its final appellate court. While the countries of the OECS in 2012, committed to acceding to the CCJ's appellate jurisdiction as soon as possible they have not yet done so. The Prime Minister of Antigua, Hon Gaston Browne, when addressing his fellow CARICOM Heads in Antigua on Tuesday the 1st of July said that his Government intended to hold a referendum as soon as was practicably possible on accession to the CCJ's appellate jurisdiction.

Jamaican Prime Minister Simpson Miller noted that in approv-

ing the constitutional amendment to sign on to the appellate jurisdiction of the CCJ, Dominica had set an example for several other member states, including Jamaica, which have not yet adopted the CCJ as their final Court of Appeal.

You will recall that in the March edition of our Newsletter last year, we spoke about the way in which the CCJ had been set up, which insulates it from the possibility of, or the appearance of, political interference. The Court is independently funded and the appointment of Judges is undertaken by an independent body namely the Regional Judicial and Legal Services Commission.

The Privy Council is a legacy from British Colonial Rule. The view has been expressed by many, that it is necessary for the Caribbean region to embrace full independence and release itself from the last vestiges of colonialism. It is also felt among other things, that the Judges of the CCJ will be more familiar with the particular nuances of the Caribbean and therefore be able to apply a local perspective to the matters that come before it.

The CCJ is able to function as an itinerant court. It is therefore able, where circumstances warrant it, to travel from the seat of the Court in Trinidad, to individual Member States to adjudicate on matters. Citizens will therefore enjoy greater access to the final Court, not only because of this, but also because it is expected to be less costly to bring matters before the CCJ than the Privy Council.

As we embark on this new chapter in our history, we adopt the words of Hon. Prime Minister Skerrit, that we look forward to our citizens taking advantage of the CCJ so that they can feel that they have gone through the full process of the justice system. I look forward to the day when the entire CARICOM region adopts the CCJ as its final court of appeal for civil and criminal matters.

### DOMINICA PARTICIPATES IN THE 8<sup>TH</sup> UK CARIBBEAN FORUM IN THE UNITED KINGDOM: 16<sup>TH</sup> TO 17<sup>TH</sup> JUNE 2014

Dominica's Minister for Agriculture and Forestry, the Honourable Matthew Walter, headed Dominica's delegation at the 8<sup>th</sup> UK Caribbean Forum, which took place in London from 16<sup>th</sup> to 17<sup>th</sup> July 2014. The two-day conference was hosted by the Hon. William Hague, the Foreign Secretary of the United Kingdom, under the theme "A Partnership for Prosperity".

Her Excellency Francine Baron, Dominica's High Commissioner to the United Kingdom and Ms Janet Charles, Second Secretary were part of the Dominica delegation. Among the delegates were UK Government Ministers, senior officials from the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and the CARICOM Secretariat, Foreign Ministers from the Caribbean including the Dominican Republic, Haiti, Cuba and the UK Overseas Territories. The Forum was first held in 1998 in The Bahamas and the UK and the Caribbean take turns in hosting the Forum. The last Forum in the Caribbean was held in Grenada.

The Forum which takes place every two years provides the opportunity for Caribbean Governments to hold high-level discussions with the UK Government. Caribbean Ministers held discussions with the Foreign Secretary and Mark Simmonds MP, Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs and the Caribbean and raised a number of on-going issues on immigration, highlighting the difficulties for business persons and artistes wanting to take advantage of the trade opportunities under the EPA. Ministers further highlighted the frustrations in respect of the restrictions of the UK visa policy for students whose professional qualifications require on-the-job training. The issue of reparations was mentioned. The UK Government were informed of the economic situation of the region and the need to renegotiate and establish new terms of engagement between small and large states and the classification of the region under the UN system.

Ministers welcomed the announcement earlier this year by the UK Government of the decision to amend the Air Passenger Duty band and saw this as a first step in the right direction to alleviate the negative impact the tax has had on the region's tourism industry. A trade and investment event took place within the margins of the Forum, to promote new business opportunities in the Caribbean. Ministers also participated in a 'Caribbean Question Time event with UK parliamentarians and the UK-Caribbean community.

At the end of the Forum, which focused on joint efforts to promote prosperity and encourage economic growth, the UK and the Caribbean agreed to follow-up on areas such as energy security, education for economic development, security and tackling serious and organised crime and foreign policy. There was a commitment to work together on a proposal of a regional gas market in the area of sustainable energy.

Both sides recognised the unique relationship that exist between the UK and the region which is based on friendship, mutual understanding and shared values and for some a historic past.

The next UK Caribbean Forum will take place in the Caribbean in 2016.

#### MASSIVE INVESTMENT IN SPORT DEVELOPMENT IN DOMINICA

During an address delivered at the 8<sup>th</sup> annual Sports Awards on Wednesday May 7th 2014, Honourable Justina Charles, Minister responsible for Culture, Sports and Youth Affairs commented, 'the Labour Party Government is well-aware of the integral role sports play in youth development and has invested tremendously in its advancement island-wide.'

Honourable Charles made special mention of various projects around the island, including investment in playing fields for several communities. The Minister confirmed that hundreds of thousands of dollars have been spent to establish new playing fields and the refurbishment of others, with villages such as Grand Fond, La Plaine, Woodford Hill, Petite Savanne benefiting from these investments. Plans are confirmed for lights to be installed at the Benjamin's Park in Portsmouth, while new hard courts have

been constructed at Tete Morne, San Sauver and Salybia. These recent investments and development of sports facilities will certainly support the advancement of young persons who are interested in enhancing their sporting talents and this in turn will place Dominica in better stead to participate in local, regional and international events.

The Minister further commented that "efforts have been put into strengthening and harmonizing our school sports programmes. Structures are put in place at the community level to ensure that all our sports people are given the opportunity to benefit and participate. We continue to provide support to all our national associations and other sporting organisations through the provision of duty free concessions and grants. The equipment stocks at our schools have been significantly increased and we have also ensured that appropriate equipment are made available to our students as they participate in age grouped sports programmes."

#### **GOVERNMENT OF DOMINICA TO CONSTRUCT INDOOR SPORTS FACILITY**


The Government of Dominica continues to recognize the role of sports in developing strong bodies and disciplined minds, and in preventing social unacceptable behaviour among the nation's youth. Prime Minister and Minister for Finance, the Honourable Roosevelt Skerrit has announced that plans are well underway for the construction of a "state of the art, indoor sporting facility" with a seating capacity of no less than 3,000. Addressing thousands of supporters of the Dominica Labour Party on Monday, May 5, 2014 in St. Joseph, Prime Minister Skerrit stated that preliminary studies have been conducted and designs for the new indoor sports complex have been mapped out.

"A team of structural engineers and architects from one of South Florida's leading construction and development firms is busy finalizing drawings that will form part of a proposal for the setting down of this facility in Dominica, before the end of this calendar year. That high level team of experienced practitioners in this business will be visiting Dominica later this month and shall seek the input of all sporting associations, in the formulation of the master plan that will be submitted to the Cabinet within the next six weeks," Prime Minister Skerrit stated.

The facility to be located at Stockfarm will be built to international specifications and will be able to host major tournaments in basketball, volleyball, netball and other such sporting disciplines. Representatives from local sporting associations are to serve on a consultative body with which the developers shall interact so as to ensure that the specific and peculiar needs and conditions of Dominica are catered for. The Government recognizes the economic potential of sports and has pursued the development of sports facilities across Dominica. The construction of the Windsor Park Stadium and the development of playing fields in Grandfond, Loubiere, LaPlaine and Petite Savanne highlight government's continued investment in sports development in Dominica.

### COUNTDOWN TO COMMONWEALTH GAMES—GLASGOW 2014 BATON RELAY IN DOMINICA



The countdown to the Commonwealth Games was signalled by the launch of the Queen's Baton Relay which took place at Buckingham Palace on 9th October 2013. The launch, which was attended by a representative of the High Commission, is the traditional curtain raiser to the Commonwealth Games. Her Majesty the Queen placed a message within the Baton before it began its journey across the Commonwealth.

The Baton arrived in Dominica on 19<sup>th</sup> March 2014 for a two-day tour and was welcomed with a traditional Kalinago dance performed by a group from Dominica's indigenous people. Officials from the Commonwealth Games

National Organizing Committee of Dominica were also at Melville Hall Airport to welcome the Baton and its custodians. Celebratory events were held with tours to several communities and a relay involving Dominican athletes and students. The Baton was also formally presented to the President of Dominica, His Excellency Charles Savarin.

The Baton arrived in Glasgow on the 14<sup>th</sup> June 2014 and the message from Her Majesty will be read at the Opening Ceremony of the Games on 23rd July 2014. Team Dominica will be proudly flying the Dominica flag and the High Commissioner extends her best wishes to the team, for every success in the Games.

#### INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT FOR DOMINICA

The Government has announced that an agreement for the construction of an international airport in Dominica is in the making and should be finalized in the coming months. The announcement was made by the Honourable Prime Minister on 5th May 2014 as he commented 'we have been having very in-depth discussions with a team of private developers out of China, who are proposing the popular BOOT - Build, Own, Operate and Transfer - option for the construction of an international airport in Dominica'.

The Prime Minister assured the nation of the Government's continued commitment regarding the construction of an international airport for Dominica. The Government recognizes that improvement to the Melville Hall Airport was necessary to meet the immediate to medium term air access needs of Dominica. Recent improvements, particularly night landing facilities, have eliminated some of the main problems faced by travellers to and from Dominica.

The Prime Minister has since led a delegation to the People's Republic of China to engage in advanced talks relating to the proposed international airport. The Prime Minister also disclosed that other developmental projects were on the agenda for discussion with the Chinese investors.

Meanwhile, in Dominica, Fete Isidore was celebrated with various activities mainly held in the villages of Grand Bay, Good Hope, San Sauveur and Petite Soufriere. Activities included a sports day, a traditional night with lapeau kabwit, a fish night, a cultural expo, a dance and other cultural activities.

Also included was the farmers' award ceremony where for the first time, 14 female farmers from Petite Soufriere, Good Hope and San Sauveur were recognized for their hard work in the agricultural sector. The fete ended on Monday 9<sup>th</sup> June with a Mass where a cultural elder was honoured.

### PROFILE OF DOMINICAN ASSOCIATIONS IN THE UNITED KINGDOM

There is a significant number of the Dominican Diaspora residing in the United Kingdom. A conservative number of 20,000 has been suggested, which would include first, second and third generation persons, who consider themselves to be of Dominican background. Given that the population of Dominica, according to the 2011 census is 70,000, we can see that in the Untied Kingdom, there is a vast and vibrant Dominican community and if efforts are jointly harnessed, a positive impact towards development in Dominica can be made.

The role of the various Dominican associations in the UK cannot be over emphasized. The associations provide a medium through which UK based Dominicans can coordinate their efforts, their time and talents towards worthy causes for Dominica. The associations also provide excellent networking facilities where Dominicans can connect with each other and celebrate the rich and unique culture of Dominica.

In the past, the associations have raised funds for disaster relief, educational grants and scholarships for Dominican students, made donations of medical supplies and equipment, and made donations to schools and libraries in Dominica.

The Dominica High Commission works with the associations, where possible, on various ventures and in the general promotion of Dominica. The High Commission applauds the work of the associations and urges members of the Dominican community in the UK to participate. In each edition of the High Commission's future newsletters, one association will be introduced and in this publication we focus on the Dominica Overseas Nationals Association.

#### **DOMINICA OVERSEAS NATIONALS ASSOCIATION (DONA)**

The Dominica Overseas Nationals Association was established as a charity in June 1978; charity number 279643. Soon after this, in August 1979 DONA assisted in sending much needed aid and medical supplies to Dominica which had been hit by destructive Hurricane David. As one of the first groups to respond to the appeal for aid, the Association, with the cooperation of British Airways and British West India Airways was able to send 17 trained nurses to Dominica. The association also provided medical equipment and other vital resources.

Since then the Dominica Overseas Nationals Association has continued to work tirelessly to provide assistance to various causes both in Dominica and the UK. The projects include providing medical equipment and resources to health establishments in Dominica; supplying Dominican schools, colleges, and the library with books and other educational material. The association also makes many monetary donations to other charitable bodies, individuals and those in need.

DONA is proud of its strong links with the Dominican community in the UK and is keen to maintain its cultural heritage. It formed a Quadrille Dance Group in 1978. The group have performed at Buckingham Palace, The Millennium Dome Greenwich, as well as community and national events all over the country.

In 2009 with a grant obtained from the London Borough of Ealing, the Association successfully organised Black History tours to Liverpool, Bristol and the British Museum in London.

Sylvia Mitchell, DONA's Development Officer, author and an advocate of the Dominican Kwéyòl language has facilitated language classes for members of the Association.

Over the years the Association has been privileged to have hosted a number of interesting talks. In 2013 as part of its Lifelong Learning Programme, Sylvia Smith, Independent Social Work Consultant and Expert Court Witness led a seminar entitled, 'A parenting workshop for everyone'. The first talk in 2014 has been on prostate cancer by Trevor Walker, a survivor of the condition and speaker from Prostate Cancer UK.

To achieve its goals DONA works closely with other groups and associations. DONA is affiliated to the Dominica Natural Disaster and Development Fund (DNDDF). DONA also has links with Waltham Forest Antigua and Barbuda and Dominica Twinning Association, which has recently celebrated 15 years since it signed its Charter.

DONA also works in partnership with the United Anglo Caribbean Society, an Ealing based Association which provides information, advice and housing to vulnerable groups and facilitates, recreational and cultural activities.

DONA's main objective for 2014 is to strengthen its relationship with Chances, A Home of Safety for Disadvantaged Children. The Home, situated in Jimmit, Dominica has benefitted from DONA's generosity in the past. Members of DONA's executive board were fortunate to have attended the home's official opening in 2011.

Monies raised from DONA's sponsored walk in May 2014 will be shared equally between 'Chances' and DONA's Building Fund.

#### **COMMONWEALTH DAY CELEBRATIONS 2014**

On Monday 11th March 2014 Her Excellency Francine Baron, the High Commissioner of the Commonwealth of Dominica, joined 52 countries to observe Commonwealth Day at Westminster Abbey, in the presence of Her Majesty the Queen and HRH Prince Phillip.

Other members of the Royal Family present included The Prince of Wales, The Duchess of Cornwall, The Earl of Wessex, and The Countess of Wessex. Other attendees included a representative from the UK government, the Commonwealth Secretary-General, senior politicians, High Commissioners, Commonwealth dignitaries and over 1,000 young people.

The theme for 2014 is **Team Commonwealth** and according to the Commonwealth Secretariat, it "expresses the spirit of friendship and motivation towards the shared goals and values that exist between

Commonwealth members." The day is celebrated on the second Monday in March every year. "It is an opportunity to promote understanding on global issues, international co-operation and the work of Commonwealth organisations, which aim to improve the lives of citizens."

The flag of the Commonwealth of Dominica was proudly carried into Westminster Abbey by Carlos Carrette. Carlos was born in Dominica and is an athlete whose specialised sporting discipline is long jump. He has competed for his school in Hackney, and has also represented the United Kingdom in several competitions. Carlos has won a number of medals and awards.

Similarly in Dominica, Commonwealth Day was recognised (students of the St Martin's Primary School had a key role in the ceremony with a rendition titled "Stand Together"). The day was observed with students from various schools participating in the annual ceremony organised by the Ministry of Education. The event was held at the Arawak House of Culture and was attended by the President of Dominica, Ministers of Government, the diplomatic corps, schools and civil society partners. Persons in attendance enjoyed a presentation by students of the sign language club of the Convent High School.

The President of Dominica, H.E. Charles Savarin, read the Commonwealth Day message from The Queen. President Savarin referred to the Commonwealth Games taking place in Glasgow later this year as "an ideal example of the Commonwealth coming together in true team spirit."

Also featured at the ceremony was the Speaker of the House of Assembly, the Hon. Alix Boyd Knights, who is also a Member of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association. The Honourable Speaker expressed the desire to see old values reinstated in society today and speaking on the theme referred to the days when team work was the hallmark of Dominica's development and stated that "we seem so ready to discard the old ways for modern ones, we hardly use team work in our development anymore, we have now become an 'I' society isolated by choice. Is it wishful thinking on my part to hope that this year's Commonwealth Day Theme may ignite a spark that induces us to be more willing to help and to share with each other?"

#### LOCAL TWINNING ASSOCIATION CELEBRATES 15 YEARS

The Mayor expressed his pleasure about the event and, as its patron, wished the Twinning Association continued success with its activities. He stressed the benefits to Waltham Forest and thanked Mr Georges for his vision for setting up the twinned arrangements.

The Chair of the Twinning Association Mr Everton George gave the vote of thanks and, with the compliments of the respective High Commissions, presented The Mayor with two beautiful publications about Antigua & Barbuda and Dominica.

The Twinning Association was set up to promote friendship, information exchange and mutual understanding of cultural, recreational and commercial activities of the linked areas. It encourages exchange visits by individuals and groups, particularly by children and young people and the development of personal contacts.

It is keen to work with local schools to form links and partnerships with schools in Antigua & Barbuda and Dominica. The 'Links and Partnerships' project will be kick-started in July and there are several elements to the project which is aimed at developing greater intergenerational and cultural links within the linked communities.



### Children's Creole Books written by Tina Jno Charles is published



Kwéyòl 4 Kids Ltd was founded in 2009, by Trina John-Charles. The vision was to provide books and teaching aids for children in Dominican and St. Lucian Creole / Kwéyòl, also known as pat-Born in Engois. land to Dominican

parents, Trina, like many other children of Kwéyòl descent living in England, was never taught Kwéyòl.

A firm and frank chastisement by a friend's mother, for not being able to speak her native language fluently, not only prompted Trina to learn Kwéyòl, but also quickly sent her entrepreneurial cogs in motion.

"My friend's Mum wanted to tell me something, but she didn't want everyone else to hear. She knew my parents were Dominican and asked if I could speak patois. When I said, 'no' she basically told me my parents had failed [laughs]. In a weird way she was right." So reminisces Trina.

"I heard Kwéyòl in the house as a child, but my parents only ever spoke it if they were discussing something they didn't want us [children] to understand, or when they were talking to their friends." Trina explains. "It was embarrassing that all my friends - Spanish, Irish, Greek, Nigerian, Ghanaian, even Welsh – all knew their mother tongues, why didn't I? This is really what prompted me to learn."

"If the language is to be perpetuated, the best way to start is with the children – from the ground up". Armed with a degree in journalism and a flair for creative writing, Trina started the Kwéyòl 4 Kids project, with a view to teach Kwéyòl in an easy format that children could follow and in a way where parents could learn with their children.


This first title is, 'My First Kwéyòl Number Book', which teaches you how to count from 1-20 in Kwéyòl.

This is accompanied by two activity books, 'My Kwéyòl Colouring Book' which is aimed at younger children, with simple Kwéyòl colouring and writing exercises. 'My Kwéyòl Activity Book' is slightly more advanced, with Kwéyòl puzzles and games, which is very popular with both adults and children alike. #### "REAL GEMS": THE POEMS OF PHYLLIS SHAND ALLFREY



For many decades, Dominican Phyllis Shand Allfrey was better known as a politician and newspaper editor than as a writer. Then came the re-publishing of her novel, The Orchid House, in the early 1980s, and her short stories, It Falls into Place (2004). Now her collected poems, Love for an Island, have just been published by Papillote Press, the small publishing company based in London and Dominica.

The High Commission hosted a book launch for Love for an Island on Monday May 12

and an enthusiastic audience was welcomed by the representative of the High Commissioner. The book was introduced by the publisher, Polly Pattullo, who talked about visiting the elderly but spirited Allfrey Poet Jane Grell and Professor Lizabeth Paravisini – Gebert in her home at Copt Hall. The book's editor, Professor Lisa Paravisini-



Gebert, discussed the poems, and a selection was read by the Dominican poet and storyteller, Jane Ulysses Grell.

Among those who attended the launch was Stewart Brown, editor of the Oxford book of Caribbean Verse, who has endorsed the book. He wrote: "Thrillingly, the collection includes real gems that truly enrich our sense of the treasury of Caribbean poetry."

Phyllis Allfrey was born in Roseau in 1908 into a white, upper-class family. However, in London, from the 1930s-1950s, she became involved in the UK Labour Party and anti-colonial activities. She returned to the Caribbean in 1955 to become the co-founder (with Emanuel Loblack) of Dominica's first mass political party, the Dominica Labour Party. She was elected to the West Indies Federation where she was a Cabinet minister. On her return to Dominica she became publisher of The Star newspaper. She died there in 1986.

#### DOMINICAN NATIONAL DR VIOLET CUFFY RECEIVES AWARD





The High Commission joins in congratulating Baroness Scotland on such an esteemed appointment.


#### DR DAVID MICHAEL ELECTED AS A COUNCILLOR FOR EVELYN WARD IN LEWISHAM

Every cook has his or her special touch which makes Cal-

laloo truly unique. Some use crab, which is easily accessible during Dominica's hunting season, while others use smoked meat. A touch of creole seasoning and herbs such as thyme, parsley and celery finish off the dish.

Callaloo has been ever popular and well loved in Dominica and during and banana, (cut the banana in slices, and the 2013 Independence celebrations, it was named as the national dish. The announcement was made by the Chief Cultural Officer, Mr Raymond Lawrence.

Mountain Chicken (or Crapaud as it is locally called) was the unofficial national dish up until that time.

It has now been confirmed that 5 students from the Convent High School in Dominica have been accepted to receive sponsorships under the CCL Education Fund. The students will receive funds to cover costs for books and tuition. The High Commission would take this opportunity to again thank all the individuals who so willingly assisted in the 2013 Fair.

#### AIR PASSENGER DUTY (APD) UPDATE

The Rt Hon. George Osborne MP, in his budget speech on 19th March 2014, announced that from 1st April 2015 the banding of APD will be reformed in that bands C and D will be abolished and flights from London to destinations 2,000 miles or under will be in band A and flights from London over 2,000 miles will be in band B. The band B rate for 2015 is planned at £71 for economy class travel and £142 for premium economy, business class and first class travel. From 1st April 2015 a family of 4 travelling to the Caribbean in economy class will see a decrease in APD from £340 to £284. A family of 4 travelling to the Caribbean in premium economy, business class or first class will see a decrease in APD from £680 to £568. Until this reform comes into effect in 2015, the following rates will apply:

- (i) Band A Countries will see the duty remain at £13 for economy class travel and £26 for premium economy, business class and first class travel;
- (ii) Band B Countries will see a rise from £67 to £69 for economy class travel and from £134 to £138 for premium economy, business class and first class travel;
- (iii) Band C Countries will see a rise from £83 to £85 for economy class travel and from £166 to £170 for premium economy, business class and first class travel;
- (iv) Band D Countries will see a rise from £94 to £97 for economy class travel and from £188 to £194 for premium economy, business class and first class travel.

A family of 4 travelling to the Caribbean in economy class will see an increase in APD from £332 to £340. A family of 4 travelling to the Caribbean in premium economy, business class or first class will see an increase in APD from £664 to £680.


